#### **BIOGRAPHIES**

For over 20 years, **Rob Kapilow** has brought the joy and wonder of classical music – and unravelled some of its mysteries – to audiences of all ages and backgrounds. Characterized by his unique ability to create an "aha" moment for his audiences and collaborators, whatever their level of musical sophistication or naiveté, Kapilow's work brings music into people's lives: opening new ears to musical experiences and helping people to listen actively rather than just hear.

Rob Kapilow's range of activities is astonishingly broad, including his What Makes It Great?® presentations (now for over 20 seasons in New York and Boston), his family compositions and Family Musik® events, his "Citypieces," corporate programs, and residencies with institutions as diverse as the National Gallery of Canada and Stanford University.

Kapilow has appeared on NBC's Today Show with Katie Couric and presented a special What Makes It Great?® for broadcast on PBS's Live From Lincoln Center. He has written two books: All You Have To Do Is Listen, which won the PSP Prose Award for Best Book in Music and the Performing Arts, and What Makes It Great (2011), the first book of its kind designed for the iPad with embedded musical examples. He is currently finishing a new book on the American Songbook.

Rob Kapilow also writes and composes new music. He was the first composer to be granted the rights to set Dr. Seuss's words to music, and his Green Eggs and Ham has been called "the most successful piece written for families this half century." He is currently working on a new piece for the 25th anniversary of Ottawa Chamberfest based on Louise Bourgeois' spider sculpture "Maman." He was featured on Chicago Public Radio's Composers In America series, and is a recipient of an Exxon Meetthe-Composer grant and numerous ASCAP awards.

Rob Kapilow has conducted many of North America's orchestras, as well as new works of musical theatre, from the Tony Awardwinning *Nine* on Broadway to the premiere of *Frida* for the opening of the Brooklyn Academy of Music's Next Wave Festival, and premieres of works for the American Repertory Theater.



Gordon Foote is currently associate dean, performance and public events, and professor of jazz at the University of Toronto Faculty of Music. Before moving to Toronto in 2012, Foote spent 26 years as a professor in the Jazz Studies Program at the Schulich School of Music of McGill University, in Montreal, Quebec, He served as dean (interim), associate dean (academic and student affairs), chair of the Department of Performance, director of graduate studies and chair of the Jazz Area. Previous to that he was a professor for six years at St. Francis Xavier University in Nova Scotia.

Foote is one of the pioneers of jazz education in Canada, developing the first undergraduate and graduate jazz degree programs in Canada. Known to have directed some of the finest university jazz ensembles anywhere, his groups have been featured throughout the United States, Canada, France, Switzerland, England, Ireland and Mexico. Gordon Foote is a Conn-Selmer artist and clinician.

The University of Toronto Jazz Orchestra (UTJO) is now in the seventh year under the leadership of Gordon Foote. The band is quickly becoming one of Canada's finest university jazz orchestras, and is the flagship group of the Jazz Studies Program at the University of Toronto.

The 17-member ensemble is part of the U of T Jazz Program, which offers Bachelor, Master and Doctoral degrees in Jazz. The UTJO works hard to produce performances that are musical and exciting, with precision and energy.

The UTJO has released two CDs in the past four years: Sweet Ruby Suite: the Music of Kenny Wheeler, featuring Norma Winstone, voice, and Dave Liebman, soprano saxophone, and Reflections, featuring the music of faculty member Mike Murley, who was also guest saxophonist on the disc. Jack Bowers of All About Jazz wrote: "The University of Toronto clearly is a music school to be reckoned with."
